#### **April Meeting**

The April meeting will be held at the *Dept. of Fish & Game Building*, 4010 West Broad Street at **7:00 pm**, **Tuesday, April 23rd**. The entrance and parking are at the rear of the building.

#### April Speaker Capt. Kevin Dubois

Captain Kevin Dubois, co-founder of Coastal Explorer Guide Service, will journey up to Richmond from Virginia Beach to be the speaker at the April VAC membership meeting. He will speak on wade fishing the area around Lynnhaven Inlet and fishing from a kayak.

Kevin is the owner of the Coastal Explorer Guide Service, a company that offers many types of guided trips. Fishing trips cover the Lynnhaven River, the Eastern Shore, the North Carolina Outer Banks and the Atlantic. Kevin has a flats skiff with casting platforms that is available for charter. He also offers guided walking tours of locations like the Backbay National Wildlife Refuge and the False Cape State Park. Kayak tours are also arranged. Coastal Explorers also offers a selection of tied flies well suited to the areas in which he guides.

Kevin has a master's degree in marine environmental research and is a United States Coast Guard licensed captain. He is one of the co-founders of the Coastal Fly Anglers. #### CATCHY COMMENTS by Dennis Cline

There have been no saltwater entries during the past month. Freshwater activity has been red hot, however. A great number of VAC anglers have been shad fishing on the James and the Roanoke. Some early returns show large hickories are back again. Mickey Kodroff found some very large fish on the Roanoke. Mickey released a 3-0 on two fly and a 3-4 on 4 plug for new club records. The fly catch tops the leader board at 400 points! The James is loaded with fish right now. Many are smallish, but occasional big hickories and whites are mixed in.

Dave Compton and Matt Bruington have landed a variety of fish from millponds lately. Dave recorded a 4-7 largemouth on 8 spin, a 1-1 white perch on 12 general and a 2-8 chain pickerel on 6 general. Matt chipped in with a 9-7 bowfin on 8 general. Dave's perch was a new club record. Randy Matthews recorded his usual white bass, a 1-2 on 2 spin from the Yadkin river. He also tangled with a 7-4 gar on 2 spin on the same day. I'll bet that gar had him thinking he had a record bass for a few minutes!

Fred Cousins recorded a 26-0 blue cat on 4 general from the James. Buddy and Danny Noland have entered a 34-0 and a 35-0 on 6 general, respectively. So far, white perch have been scarce, but Bob Brown released a 1-3 on 4 plug for a new club record. Clint Peters released a nice 1-7 yellow perch on 4 general for another club record. Tom Barnett released the largest sunfish of the year, a nice 1-0 on 2 spin.

March Angler of the Month honors went to yours truly, for the 55-0 blue cat on 4 general reported in last month's newsletter. It's a good thing I got the "real story" out when I did, or no telling how many different club members might have caught that fish!! **Glenn Carter** took second place and third place in the monthly


contest. His 1-6 yellow perch on 2 spin took second and his 2-10 hickory shad on 2 fly placed third.

It sounds like Mother Nature was a bit on the nasty side for their trip (snow and cold weather), but at least a few steelheads cooperated. Ronnie set two club records with a 12-0 on 12 fly and a beautiful 14-0 on 8 fly. Glen and Mickey also caught fish, but I don't have their cards yet.

Saltwater action is just around the corner, so get your stuff together. I think I hear the drum a drumin'!

#### Ukrop's Golden Receipts Time



#### **EMPTY Oceans, EMPTY Nets**

Watch this in Richmond - WCVE, Richmond, VA -- Mon 4-22-02, 10 pm.

EMPTY Oceans, EMPTY Nets is a television documentary produced by Habitat Media that will air nationally on PBS on Earth Day, April 22. The one-hour documentary, explores the immense changes threatening marine fisheries worldwide and efforts being made to restore and sustain them. EMPTY Oceans is Part One of a 2-part series with a focus on the global fisheries crisis. The documentary presents ample evidence that many species of fish are on the brink of commercial extinction. Despite the ever-intensifying, high-tech global fishing effort, the world catch has

been steadily declining while the demand for seafood continues to grow.

The Habitat crew circled the globe documenting selected case studies of fisheries in transition--some contributing to ecological disasters, some in the process of positive change, and others as bountiful examples of what effective management can accomplish. Commentary is provided by a variety of fishermen and by some of the world's ultimate authorities in marine science. A take-home message is that new initiatives are emerging that give consumers and citizens a powerful role in promoting sustainable fishing practices.

#### Allocation of Striped Bass - the Economic Truth

In the year 2000 a study was conducted by Dr. James Kirkley and Winnie Ryan of the Virginia Institute of marine Science (VIMS) and Dr. Kenneth McConnell of the University of MD. This study was titled "Economic Aspects of Allocating Striped Bass -- Among Competing User Groups in Virginia". The report was done for VMRC and partially funded with saltwater fishing license money. It is 64 pages long and goes into great detail on how they arrived at their findings. The first 8 pages of the study are an executive summary; that is, they explain the findings in somewhat plain English. Below is a verbatim copy of a part of the executive summary, It speaks for itself.

"Using information obtained from various surveys of commercial watermen and recreational anglers in 1998 and 1999, a combination of input-output or economic impact models and statistical models were used to estimate the impacts (i.e., total sales, total income, and total full-time employment generated for the economy of Virginia) and benefits (measured in terms of consumer surplus which is the dollar amount an individual receives from a good or service in excess of what was actually paid for the good or service, and producer surplus or the amount received by producers in excess of what it actually cost to produce the good or service or payments to value added inputs such as labor and owners of capital and land) to society from different allocations of striped bass. The different allocations examined were as follows: (1) 100% and 0.0% for each user group; (2) 75% and 25% for each group; and (3) 50% and 50% for each group. It was the intent of the study to also determine an optimum mix of the allocation (i.e., a certain non-zero percent allocation to each user group). Early analysis of the economic impacts and societal benefits, however,

revealed the optimum allocation should be 100 percent to the recreational sector. That is, maximum social benefits and potential sales, income, and employment were associated with a 100% allocation of the 1998 total allowable catch to the recreational sector. As a consequence, there was no need to further examine an optimum allocation.

Based on results obtained for 1998, a 100 percent allocation to the recreational sector has the potential to generate \$181.1 million (measured in year 2000 constant dollar value) in total sales, \$101.3 million in total income, and 3,738 full time equivalent employees (person-years of employment) to the economy of Virginia. A 100% allocation to the commercial sector has the potential to generate a total sales value of \$23.9 million, \$17.6 million in total income, and total employment of 517 full time equivalent employees to the economy of Virginia.

In terms of benefits to society, a 100% allocation to the recreational sector, after deducting for expenditures and travel costs, generates approximately \$27.6 million in benefits to recreational anglers. In comparison, a 100% allocation to the commercial sector generates approximately \$5.6 million in net benefits to waterman, processors, wholesalers, distributors, restaurants, retail outlets, and consumers. The commercial benefits include consumer surplus and producer surplus, and the recreational benefits exclude profit or producers' surplus in the commercial-recreational fishery (e.g., party and charter boats and commercial fishing piers)."

VMRC has not made any comments or taken any action since the study was completed and turned over to them...




