It's Yellow Perch Time

It will be late January when you receive this newsletter, duck hunting season is over and the tidal rivers are left to the hardy fishermen and ladies looking for yellow perch. This is prime time for one of Virginia's most beautiful and tasty freshwater fish. Yellow perch fishing has been quite good in recent years and the number and size of trophy perch has really been improving. Since the club's yellow perch tournament is going to be on the Chickahominy River some tips might be in order to help you catch some real nice fish before, during and after the tournament.

Historically the largest yellow perch caught in the club have been caught in shallow water in the Chickahominy River and its major creeks. Robbie Robinson caught his 1-13 up on the stump flat below the dam. Rucker Macdonald caught his 1-11 up on the flats in Yarmouth creek between the two deep holes. Lynn Spurlin caught his 1-10 on a flat in front of a gut below the Riverside ramp close to very deep water. John Wycoff and Virgil Hughs caught big perch in the shallows on the big bend hole in Yarmouth Creek. So you see a pattern here don't you. Shallow water yellow perch fishing is done with grubs and real light jig heads. In recent years power bait and gulp grubs have been the ticket. Remember if it is big perch you are after then big (3") grubs and sassy shads work well and the best color is generally chartreuse. 2 inch grubs and sassy shads also work well. When selecting jig heads keep several things in mind: use the lightest jig head that you can while being able to continuously being able to feel the jig when swimming it and when it hits the bottom on the drop, use short shank thin wire hooks and red is ok, use contrasting colored jig heads in relation to the grub color with pink and white working well with chartreuse grubs. Generally spinning tackle is used for this type of fishing. One suggestion is to use the highest quality rod you can afford to buy and try to get titanium guides on the rod. The rod I use is a Fenwick HMG-AV aramid veil design GAVS 6'3" MHM that is designed for 3/16 to 5/8 oz lures and 8 to 17 lb line. Obliviously the manufacturers don't know a thing about light tackle fishing as I use 2lb test line when using this rod. I use a Shimano Sustain 2000FB reel but the Stradic reel is very good also. You will be amazed at what you can feel with the high modulus graphite rods and that feel translates into more fish hooked as you recognize more strikes and can "feel" the bottom. The presentation can vary between a slow (real slow) steady retrieve along the bottom to slightly hopping the grub back to just letting the grub sit still for what seems way too long. All techniques work when casting in the shallows and by shallows it can be 8 to 10 feet next to a deep hole all the way up to 2 to 3 feet or even shallower. Generally as February moves into early March the biggest fish move shallower as they get ready to spawn and actually spawn. This holds true except in Yarmouth where the best fishing is in January and early February and yes the fish are shallow when there is ice on the creek.



Most anglers vertical jig in deep water in the holes. In our club this has produced numerous 1-2 to 1-4 lb perch. The best approach is to use plug tackle again with the very best rod you can afford and the quality of the rod may be even more critical with a plug rod as the whole technique is based on feel. The rod I use is a G-Loomis SBR 751 extra fast action designed for 1/4 oz to 3/8 oz and 8 to 12 lb test line and is 6'3" long. I use a Shimano Calcutta 50 loaded with 2# test line – ditto comments about rod design for light tackle. As with spinning, 2 and 4 lb test line work best as they afford the jig and blade bait to work best (no leader). The no leader comment is intended to generate the best perch bite but you might want to use 8 or 12lb leader if you think there is the possibility of also catching a bluecat or bowfin or carp in the deep holes which is quite common especially in Yarmouth. When fishing deep water, a 1/4 oz. silver buddy in either silver or gold will work well when the fish are really turned on. Sometimes you have to explore a bit to find the best concentration of fish and or the biggest fish. The holes in Yarmouth and at the dam are very good locations. The water can be 12 to 15 all the way to 25 feet. However the perch aren't always turned on. When they seem picky as in won't strike a silver buddy or hit short a different lure selection will work. Try a cicada or crazy blade or a gay blade. I like the 1/4 oz. cicada with the chartreuse insert and either silver or gold body over a silver buddy. The vibration is at a higher frequency per inch of vertical movement than a silver buddy and the hooks are 2 pointed upturned hooks that will not hang up as much on the bottom as silver buddy treble hooks do. One other secret, when vertical jigging try to only move the blade bait up 1 to 2 inches and let it back down slowly with a taunt line. This jigging technique will kill them when a 6 to 8 inch rapid jerk up followed by a freefall down produces nothing. You really have to work at only moving the blade bait up 1 to 2 inches and that is why a cicada with the fast vibration works best. Also try moving the blade bait an inch off the bottom and just let it sit still. Another secret when the perch have lock jaw is to downsize a blade or grub. The cicadas and crazy blades come in micro sizes that are also deadly. It just takes total concentration and super sensitivity to fish these micro baits (1/32 and 1/64 oz).

Last year there was some very good fishing on the Chickahominy well into the 2nd week of March so don't give up just because you might have a slow day during the first week. Also good yellow perch fishing occurs in Dragon Run, the creeks off the Rappahannock close to Tappahannock and the Mattaponi and Pumunkey Rivers with the Mattaponi having the best fishing later. Historical records indicate that the Mattaponi is good for several perch over 2lbs each year. And then there is Moomaw which produces jumbo perch into May but that is a different story.

The general section will have more than one screen giving a good overall view of the club. The site is a work in progress and has not been activated yet, so the link will not work.

When you click on "member's area", members in good standing will have an individual account there that is accessed by a username of their choice and will be secure for their viewing only by use of a pass word that they select. When in the "member's area", you will be able to do such things as view your catch records, the Angling Rules, a copy of the Roster and many other things. THE WEBSITE FUND

The Board of Directors voted to use donations to the Website Fund as the <u>only source of funding</u> for the development and maintenance of the website during 2008. 

From Washington, DC


From Washington, DC Take I-95 South. Exit 86B onto Route 656, Elmont West. At second light, turn left onto Route 1 South for one mile. Turn left onto Virginia Center Parkway. Follow Virginia Center Parkway for 9/10 of a mile and turn left into the Resort entrance.

From Charlottesville, Virginia

Take I-64 East to I-295 South. Follow I-295 for 8 miles. Stay in right lane and merge "To Exits 43 D-C-B-A, US 1". Take Exit 43C US 1 North to Ashland. Exit ramp will merge onto US 1 North (Brook Road). Follow US 1 for 3/10 of a mile to first stop light at Virginia Center Parkway, turn right. Follow Virginia Center Parkway for 9/10 of a mile and turn left into the Resort entrance.

From Richmond, Virginia & North Carolina
