

CATCHY COMMENTS

The azaleas are blooming and the Shad are in the rivers. Discussion at the board meeting this past Tuesday indicated that several boats had caught over 200 Shad per boat during the tournament last weekend. It seems that the larger fish had arrived several weeks ago; and now, smaller Shad are being caught.

Leroy Houser turned in his entry card for the "heaviest" Blue Catfish of the year. **Leroy** and **Gary Martel** were fishing the James River, February 27th and landed several fish over 50 pounds. The largest was the 76 pound, 8 ounce, Blue Catfish on 12# general worth 531 points and new 12# general Club Record. The fish was also "released" to fight another day.

Fred Cousins and **Reggie White** went "Gar" fishing to Chipokes Creek in early March. **Fred** caught a 9 pound Gar on 2# plug for 327 points. But, **Reggie** managed to top that catch with a 11 pound, 14 ounce, fish on 2# spin worth 431 points. **Reggie's** fish now takes the lead for "spin division", "species", and also the "heaviest" category. Later in the month, **Fred** and **Reggie** went back to the "Hot Ditch" for Speckled Trout. **Reggie** started it off with a 5 pound, 12 ounce, Trout on 4# spin for 287 points. That evening, **Fred** beat **Reggie** on points with a 5 pound, 10 ounce, Spotted Seatrout on 2# spin for 375 points.

Billy Nicar was fishing Raintree Lake on March 8th and caught a nice 8 pound Largemouth Bass. **Billy** was using a jig to land the 266 point fish on 8# plug. The Largemouth will take the lead for the "heaviest" division and is one of the more difficult entries for the Master Angler Award.

Bob Shepherd and **Fred Murray** were again fishing for Blue Catfish on the James River. **Bob** ended the day with a 53 pound Catfish on 6# general for 498 points. The fish is a little smaller than Bob's earlier Blue Catfish entry of 57 pounds.

Robbie Robinson and **Mike Cline** fished the Chickahominy River the middle of March. **Mike** had the best Ring Perch. **Mike** was jigging a "blade bait" on 2# spin to land the 1 pound 4 ounce fish for 328 points. The Yellow Perch will lead the "species" and "heaviest" categories. Not to be outdone, **Robbie** went on a rampage to catch three "species" leaders. Robbie first caught a 337 point Bowfin on 2# plug, a 4 pound, 8 ounce, Largemouth Bass for 300 points, and finally a 1 pound, 4 ounce, Crappie on 2# spin worth 198 points. The Largemouth is also the 2# plug Club Record. Not a bad day!

Fishing for Shad on St. Patrick's Day at Weldon NC; **Jim Sheffield** and **Mickey Kodroff** had a successful trip. **Jim** caught a 2 pound Hickory on 2# spin for 227 points and takes the "heaviest" lead. The following day at Rocky Mount, **Jim** landed a huge 5 pound American Shad, using two shad darts, on 2# spin for 400 points. The American Shad leads the "species" and "heaviest" categories.

Parks Rountrey fished the Elizabeth River one more time this Spring. **Parks** finished the day with a 3 pound Spotted Seatrout on 2# spin for 200 points. **Parks** was using a grub to catch this trout.

Brothers, **Eddy** and **Nelson Johnston** were Shad fishing the James River during the middle of the week to avoid some of the weekend crowds. **Nelson's** best catch was a 1 pound, 11 ounce, Hickory on 6# spin for 184 points using a dart for bait. **Eddy** had the top fish for the day, a 1 pound, 12 ounce, Hickory on 2# tippet worth 250 points. **Eddy's** fish now leads both the "species" and "heaviest" categories for Hickory Shad.

David Nobles has been using some free time away from his CCA responsibilities to fish some ponds and creeks this year. Fishing a private pond in Lanesville, Virginia, on March 22nd, **David** entered an 8 ounce Sunfish and a 5 pound, 13 ounce Largemouth Bass using a Golden Retriever fly on 6# tippet. The Sunfish is worth 113 points and the Largemouth 290. The following weekend, while fishing Beaver Creek, **David** landed a 2 pound, 2 ounce Rainbow Trout for 120 points on 4# fly.

The saltwater fishing is beginning to pick up in Virginia with the Flounder and Croaker around the CBBT and rivers. Off North Carolina, the tuna are getting more abundant along with large Dolphin and a few billfish being caught off Hatteras. I'm looking forward to the winds to slow down a little!

VAC MEMBER MIKE SWEENY PULLS LINES ON MARCH 27, 2011



Virginia Anglers Club Member Mike Sweeny passed away unexpectedly on Sunday, March 27, 2011. Mike joined the VAC in September, 2009. Although Mike was a member of the VAC f or a relatively short time, he was a faithful in his attendance at the VAC Monthly Membership Meetings ("the guy with the white beard who sat up front on the left side"). Mike was also a member of the CCA-VA and was a willing volunteer to help any way he could with any CCA-VA function. Mike spent most every weekend at his cottage on Gwynn's Island. Rockfish and speckled trout were his favorite species to catch. A faithful member of the Virginia Anglers Club has pulled lines for the last time.

AMERICAN SHAD RESTORATION PROJECT IS UNDERWAY

The American Shad Restoration Project is underway to collect American shad eggs and stock the young fish when they're only a few days old as part of a cooperative effort to replenish shad stocks in the James and Rappahannock rivers. Eggs are collected from American shad in the Pamunkey River for the James stockings and from shad in the Potomac River for the Rappahannock stockings. Since 1992 over 111 million shad fry have been stocked in the upper James, and since 2003 over 30 million have been stocked in the upper Rappahannock.

SHAD CAM IS READY TO ROLL AS FISH PASSAGES OPEN

The Boshers Dam fishway is now open for the season and Shadcam is up and running. Once again, enthusiasts will be able to enjoy capturing images of American shad and the 20+ other species of riverine fishes that typically pass through the fishway on the James River each spring.

ATTENTION FRESHWATER ANGLERS FISHING IN "ANADROMOUS" TIDAL WATERS

If you are a freshwater angler who is fishing for "anadromous" species in tidal waters or rivers where anadromous fish migrate upstream to spawn, you need to be aware of new regulations enacted by the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC) that affect you. The new **Saltwater Fisherman Identification Program (FIP) requires Angler Registration starting January 1, 2011 for all saltwater anglers.** VMRC will also implement a free state saltwater angler identification program as of January 1, 2011. Purchasers of annual Virginia saltwater fishing licenses do NOT have to register. The Virginia Fisherman Identification Program (FIP) will require unlicensed saltwater anglers aged 16 and older to register and receive an identification number annually. **Adult anglers who fish for anadromous or marine species in freshwater must also register.** These species include striped bass (rockfish), shad or other tidal species that live in saltwater but spawn in freshwater. So if you're fishing for, or may catch, a saltwater fish such as a striper anywhere in Virginia's tidal waters, you'll need either a Virginia saltwater fishing license, or to register with the FIP.

There is no cost for registration. Online registration is available on VMRC's website. To register by phone, call toll-free 1-800-723-2728. For more information, visit VMRC's website or contact VMRC at (757) 247-2200.



The knife has the following pull out tools: scissors, a knife with a 1 3/8" long blade, a nail file with a small Phillips head screw driver on the end, a bottle opener with a flat blade screw driver on the end and a white plastic tooth pick held in a small slot in the end of the knife. The split ring on the end of the knife can be used to connect the knife to a key chain, etc. The price of the knife is \$20.00

LOOKING FOR SUCCESSFUL LARGE MOUTH BASS FISHING??

The March 9, 2011 *Outdoor Report* issued electronically by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries contained an article about which Virginia reservoirs offered the best large mouth fishing. Here is the article as quoted from the *Outdoor Report* noted (underlining added). The last three articles below are quoted from the same source.

** Virginia Reservoirs Ranked for Largemouth Bass Fishing **

(Quoted from the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries March 9, 2011 Outdoor Report) "VDGIF aquatic biologists spend considerable effort and resources to manage, enhance, and protect largemouth bass populations in Virginia's public fishing reservoirs, lakes, and ponds. Most of these waters are sampled each year, or every few years, to assess current largemouth bass population parameters such as age and growth, spawning success, and size distribution. These population samples are generally collected using daytime, boat electrofishing gear targeting largemouth bass and are conducted in a manner that allows several comparisons to be made concerning fish populations. Since many Virginia anglers target largemouth bass, and fish larger than 15 inches are considered "preferred" nationwide; the following summary contains information about bass over 15 inches (preferred size). Relative stock density of preferred fish (RSD-P below)

is the proportion of bass in a population over eight inches (stock size or recruits) that are also at least 15 inches. Thus, this index describes the size structure of the population and the bigger the number, the higher the percentage of big bass (>15 inches) in the population. Catch-per-unit-effort of preferred fish (CPUE-P below) is a measure of how many bass over 15 inches are collected by biologists during a set unit of effort (in this case, 1-hour of electrofishing). Thus, the higher the number, the more abundant big bass were during the sample.

Several factors can bias these data (e.g., weather conditions, fish behavior), but samples were conducted with efforts to minimize these biases. The following is a summary of these data with lakes ranked by CPUE-P and divided into the four management regions of the state. Those lakes ranked at the top of the table will provide excellent opportunities for anglers to catch quality largemouth bass. You might notice that some of the large reservoirs are ranked lower than you might expect. Smaller reservoirs normally have higher sampling efficiency and will thus rank higher based on this evaluation. This is a guide for anglers to use and not necessarily the entire picture of Virginia bass fisheries but it will provide a good place to start. We hope you find this useful.

Local News:

Flounder:

The Virginia Marine Resources Commission has voted to lower the recreational size limit for flounder, allowing anglers to keep more of the flounder they catch this year. This was possible due to a higher quota from an increase in biomass over the past few years. The new size limit will be 17.5 inches, with a four fish possession limit and no closed season. Last year's limits were 18.5 inches with a four fish possession limit and no closed season.

Local Blue Crabs:

The Virginia Marine Resources Commission and Maryland fishery managers today announced that the Chesapeake Bay's blue crab population is at its second highest level since 1997 and well above the target for the third year in a row. The results of the 2011 Blue Crab Winter Dredge Survey indicate that management measures put into place in 2008 to conserve female crabs are continuing to pay dividends for the crab population, the seafood industry, recreational crabbers and those who just plain enjoy the Bay's favorite crustacean.

Sturgeon Report:

Tried some large mesh gillnets upstream with no luck. They are catching juveniles downstream that we put transmitters internally. These tags will last 4 years and there is very little chance the tag will be expelled.

He is a 4 foot fish tagged and released on April 18th. The water being pumped over his gills is a low MS222 dilution to sedate the fish.

I'd like to thank William Gottwald for his very generous gift to the VCU Rice Center for sturgeon research.

Back by popular demand. Our Club has not done this for years. Don't miss this one! Our tourney date is near peak of the spring drum migration. You should have waders, a fairly shallow draft boat (or ride with a fellow member) and be prepared for a long hike after anchoring your boat in shallow water behind a barrier island. Contact **event chairman Bob Shepherd** to confirm your participation and also to check event dates if weather or surf conditions are questionable.

Times: Sun-up Saturday to Sundown Sunday

Location: Barrier Islands of Virginia Eastern Shore

For those who may be unfamiliar with the Eastern Shore, but still would like to fish, please contact Bob Shepherd (tournament chairman). Bob will be glad to lead people to the fishing grounds (keeping in mind that different sized boats may have to take different paths to access the islands).

Tips: Peeler crabs and fresh cut bait (such as croakers, whiting, bluefish, menhaden, etc.) are all good red drum baits. Black drum are frequently caught from the surf this time of year as well, so fishing with peeler crabs opens the opportunity to catch those as well. A half dozen peeler crabs can get an angler through the day when things are slow, but on a good bite, or when bait stealers are prevalent, it's not uncommon to burn through 1.5 dozen peelers per angler per day.


